



Online Safety Advice and Resources for Parents/ Carers

Please find below a reminder of some of the resources that have been sent out previously:

As parents/carers, we understand that you may have worries about online safety. Below you will find advice from www.internetmatters.org and links to useful websites/organisations that provide specific resources around online safety for children and young people.

- Check your parental controls – make use of the control settings on your home broadband and any internet abled devices. You can find out how to do this at www.internetmatters.org
- Use ‘safe search’ settings on search engines/sites such as Google and Youtube.
- Agree boundaries about what your child can and can’t do online – where they can use the internet, how much time they spend online, the sites they can visit and the type of information they can share.
- Explore together – ask your child to tell you what they like doing online. Encourage them to use devices in communal areas so you can see what sites they are visiting.
- Check if the games, apps, films and social networks are age appropriate. The minimum age for most social networks is 13 including Facebook and Instagram. You can check specific games, films, TV programmes and apps on www.commonsemmedia.org.
